DISCUSSION

- Police Department Operational Needs
 - Operates 24/7
 - Patrol vehicles face accelerated wear due to:
 - Emergency response driving (Speeding, turning, terrain)
 - Multi-role usage: daily patrol, traffic, task force, detective
 - Patrol vehicles must remain fully functional and available at all times



DISCUSSION

- Current Fleet Conditions
 - 10 Patrol Fleet Vehicles Total
 - 1 for Watch Commander, 1 for Traffic
 - 4 new EV Chevy Blazers (2 day, 2 night)
 - 6 available for general patrol use

- Need for Patrol vehicles
 - Department is operating at a full-time capacity rate
 - Vehicle availability
 can vary:
 maintenance, special
 operations, prisoner
 transportation, etc.



DISCUSSION

- Operational Benefits of adding two Patrol Vehicles
 - Increases patrol fleet readiness and rotation capacity
 - Reduces strain and extends vehicle lifespan
 - Supports maintenance schedules without disrupting service
 - Enhances officer morale and operational efficiency
 - Provides flexibility for specialized deployments without impacting core patrol
